Seeking Holiness In The Sermon on the Mount

Matthew 5-7 is popularly known as the Sermon on the Mount. This text has long been recognized as the pinnacle of Jesus' teaching and presents a high ideal for living. Some, however, consider Jesus' teachings too lofty or idealistic to fulfill and thus conclude that his teachings cannot offer much practical guidance for everyday life.

Maybe the reason some despair of being able to follow the teachings of the Sermon on the Mount is that they see the sermon as a mirror. When they view their reflection in this mirror, they see mostly inadequacies. They may view the sermon as God's microscope for examining our lives. When God looks at us in this way, we all look small and full of flaws.

What if, however, the sermon is a window? When we look through a window, we see beyond the room where we are standing. We see beyond the house where we live. We see the larger world. If we view this sermon as a window, then we can see beyond our own failures. We can see life in the light of God's intention for our lives.

On Wednesday nights, we are beginning a new Bible study that will help us see through the window of the Sermon on the Mount in order to gain a fuller vision of life as God intends it. Through five lessons, we will seek holiness in Jesus' sermon.

Bible translators use the English word "holy" to translate the Hebrew (godesh) and Greek (hagios) terms that mean something "set apart" or "different." Certainly, the Bible teaches that God's people are to be different and called to a higher standard. The English word "holy," however, has an interesting history. It comes from the German word heil, which refers to something unbroken, healthy, or complete. Our word "whole" comes from the same root. "Holiness" and "wholeness" have something in common. Holiness, being set apart as God's people, is rooted in wholeness, being healthy or complete.

The Sermon on the Mount can help us become holy by helping us find wholeness. Looking through this

window, we can see a whole picture. We can see how the parts of life fit together. We can gain a unified new of ourselves in God's world.
